Black HISTORY Month

Leroy Douglass Hemphill was born September 19, 1920. Back in the day when people could depend upon extended families to help raise nieces, nephews or grandchildren, he was lucky enough to be reared by his grandparents, here in Drumright. He was raised by Reverend and Mrs. A. H. Davidson. Leroy attended and graduated from Dunbar School. Down at the depot, we have old photos and school record books displaying his successes as a good student and a good athlete. This is where Leroy Hemphill's story began.

At Dunbar in Drumright,
Leroy became a star
athlete. Mr. Joe Sebastian
Johnson was the principal
and in the late 1930s, Mr.
Johnson added high school
boys' basketball to the

curriculum and became the coach. Leroy excelled at basketball. In 1938, Leroy led Dunbar to the Cimarron Valley Athletic Association Championship. This team won the championship, even though Dunbar School had no gym in which to practice and they were not allowed to use the gym at the white high school.

Leroy's fame grew and he was recruited to play football at Langston
University on an athletic scholarship. He lettered in football there and again, was a star player. In 1942, he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Industrial Arts. His goal was to become an Industrial Arts teacher and a basketball coach. Joe S. Johnson, who had coached leroy in high school at

Dunbar in Drumright, was now the Principal at Cushing's Booker T. Washington High School. Leroy was hired to coach basketball and teach shop classes. His position as head coach there lasted for 13 years, netting well over 400 wins in basketball, while losing less than 50 games. His teams won Class "C" State basketball championships 9 out of 13 times, District Championship 11 out of 13 times, and A, B and C Championships 8 times. They also won the National Negro High School Invitational Tournament Championship in Tennessee State University in Nashville, twice, and third place once.

With such an illustrious record, when integration came in 1956, Leroy Hemphill was hired at Cushing High School as an assistant basketball and football coach. He continued to teach shop classes. By 1960, he was teaching shop classes at Cushing Junior High and High School, while remaining an assistant coach.

Coach Hemphill (as he was always called) married Eloise Muck, from Cushing. She also graduated from Langston University, and held a Bachelor of Science Degree. They had two children, Douglass and Lisa. He continued his education and received a Master's Degree in Industrial Arts Education from

Oklahoma State University in Stillwater. Leroy was very active in the community and participated in the Masonic Lodge, the lota Lambda Sigma Fraternity, the Cushing Chamber of Commerce and even served for a time as an Auxiliary Cushing Police officer.

Coach Hemphill would coach at Cushing High School until 1969. At that time, he left and began working at Langston University as an Assistant Basketball coach and Technology Department instructor. In 1975, he returned to Cushing as acounselor and Industrial Arts teacher. He was soon promoted to the position of Assistant Principal.

But, he became ill in 1979 and died unexpectedly on August 21, 1979 at the age of 58. Leroy Douglas Hemphill is buried in Silver Star Cemetery in Cushing, Oklahoma. Hemphill Park was established in the northwest area of Cushing to honor this special individual.

DRUMRIGHT HISTORICAL SOCIETY MUSEUM

To maintain transparency and open communication with our community, we'd like to provide you with an overview of the Drumright Museum's financial status and shed light on some challenges we are currently facing.

Below, you will find a spreadsheet detailing the sources of income that sustain our museum. We believe in keeping our community informed about the financial aspects of our organization, and this breakdown illustrates the key contributors to our operational budget.

The primary sources of income for the Drumright Museum are as follows:

- 1. Corporate Sponsorship: We are grateful for the support we receive from corporate sponsors who recognize the value of preserving our local oilfield history. You will notice that sponsorships have declined from \$5000 in 2019, to \$1500 in 2023.
- 2. Individual Memberships: The engagement of individuals in our community is crucial, and we appreciate the ongoing support from our members. Memberships in 2019 were \$875, \$905 in 2020, \$0 in 2021, \$2225 in 2022 and \$645 in 2023. An individual membership is only \$10/year, family and other membership levels are \$25, \$50, \$100 and a lifetime membership of \$500.
- 3. City of Drumright Gift: We are fortunate to receive a monthly gift of \$700 from the City of Drumright, which provides funding to hire a host for the museum. This job is such a crucial part of the museum, but the compensation is a mere \$7.25/hour for 20 hours/week and finding someone to commit for this amount is challenging. Thankfully, our current host enjoys his time at the museum and is willing to go above and beyond his pay.
- 4. Grants: The museum has been fortunate to receive grants from The Oklahoma Department of Libraries, the Oklahoma Historical Society, and the Oklahoma Arts and Humanities Council. These grants have played a crucial role in sustaining the museum, supporting its operations, adding storage to our oil room, providing funds for lawncare, hiring a custodian, and raising the hourly salary of \$7.25/hour to \$10/hour for one year. Unfortunately, these grants have come to an end. While we are immeasurably grateful for the support we've received from these organizations, the conclusion of these funding streams poses significant challenges. No longer will there be funds for a custodian, for lawncare or to provide our host with \$10/hour. Efforts to find and apply for grants are ongoing.
- 5. Donations: Contributions of time and money from community members and beyond play a vital role in sustaining our museum. Unfortunately, over the past few years, these have also declined.
- 6. Events / Fundraisers: At the time of this writing, the Museum and the Drumright Boomtown Theater just wrapped up The Frisco Polar Express. Financial information will be available in next month's newsletter. In addition, the Museum Board already has four 2024 fundraisers in their first stages.

We appreciate your time and consideration and welcome questions, suggestions, and solutions.

CARTER WOODSON

The son of former slaves, Carter Woodson was born in Virgina on December 18, 1875. He was an American historian, author, journalist, and the founder of the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH). Woodson was the second African American to obtain a PhD degree from Harvard University. He is the only person whose parents were enslaved in the United States to obtain a PhD in history.

In February 1926, he launched a celebration known as "Negro History Week," the precursor to Black History Month. Dr. Woodson has been called the "father of black history."

Woodson died on April 3,1950 in Washington, D.C., at the age of 74.



Richard A. "Rick" Sellers, III

Richard A. "Rick" Sellers III was born on September 8, 1956, in Norman, Oklahoma. He slipped his Earthly bonds after an extended illness on January 13, 2024, at St. Frances Hospital in Tulsa, Oklahoma at the age of 67 years, 4 months, & 5 days. His loving wife, Myrna, was by his side, as she had been since 1979, when the young couple were married in a service held at Cayuga Splitlog Mission Church, near Grove, Oklahoma.

Rick was raised in Grove and graduated from Grove High School in 1974. Following that, he attended Oklahoma University in Norman, where he studied Petroleum Geology. After college, Rick moved to Drumright, Oklahoma, where he worked alongside his father in the oil field. He would remain active in the oil and gas business for the next four decades.

Continuing his work alongside his father, they were challenged by the lack of service rigs to complete and maintain the oil production process. Always a problem solver, Rick began building the service rigs and put them to work on their wells. Soon, they were providing a much-needed service to other companies around the region. Rick ran several oil field service companies for many years, including Creek County Well Service, Osage County Well Service and Payne County Well Service. In 1992, Rick sold the companies and went back

into oil & gas production partnering with his father in a company called Double Eagle Petroleum. After a downturn in the oil business, Rick and Myrna explored other ways to make a living. They looked at the animal park at Arbuckle Wilderness in Davis, Oklahoma, and Dog Patch USA. a shuttered theme park near Harrison, Arkansas that still had a working fish hatchery and a spring water bottling plant. The couple also looked at several marinas near Grove, but the draw of the oil patch was strong, and Rick soon teamed with his father again in the formation of Southwest Petroleum Corporation. At this point, the Sellers had the equipment and manpower to do their own thing in the oilfield. Not wanting to be solely dependent on oil, Rick went on to diversify into the gas side of the business with the formation of Keystone Gas in 2000, which employed many people from across the region.

Always an adventurer at heart, in 1983 Rick traveled to the Petén rainforest in Guatemala to drill oil wells for El Presenente José Efraín Ríos Montt, the country's de-facto leader. The mission wasn't without risk as there was great unrest in the country and the deadline for completion was tight and needed to be finished before rebels and death squads closed in. Rick contracted a rare fungal disease called Valley Fever on that journey into the ancient tropical rainforests which did not show itself until twenty years later. It negatively impacted his health for the rest of his life.

In addition to his work in the oil and gas business, Rick was passionate about many things, and he enjoyed working with others to bring those interests to life. In 2014, he worked with automotive designer, Clint Fisher, to open Dangerous Motors in Cushing. The company offers custom car rebuilds and hot rods of every description. Rick also purchased KUSH AM 1600 radio in Cushing and worked with manager and "KUSH Girl" Molly Payne, and programmer and on-air personality Hugh "Doc" Foley, to upgrade and bring the historic station into the modern era. The radio outlet not only serviced the community with local news and sports but also became a leader in Oklahoma broadcasting as a reporting station for the Texas Regional Radio Report, the Americana Music Association and CDX TRACtion airplay charts. In 2022, Rick secured an FM license for KUSH, and he personally climbed in the lift to place the new transmitter at the top of the tower! Rick was always a big supporter of musicians and artists, and he spent several years partnered in an independent record label, Way Out West Records, with Clif Doyal of Nashville, and local talents, Tim and Shawna Russell. Shawna and label mates LiveWire both made waves in the country music and Texas/Red Dirt genres in the U.S. and in Europe.

Rick had many hobbies. He enjoyed building Condor Custom boats, late sixties and seventies muscle cars and motorcycles, and collected comic books and oil field memorabilia. A great marksman, he also won numerous shooting competitions. Rick took immense pride in his local community, and he gave back in many ways. In addition to being a longtime member of the Chamber of Commerce, he and Myrna worked together to make sure that the Drumright city parks had working restrooms, electricity and the grass mowed. He saw to it that the flags flown on main street were replaced regularly and streetlights were maintained. A big history buff, Rick also loved preserving the past and was a member of the Drumright Historical Museum. He also cared deeply about the people of his community and was always ready to help those in need and give them a hand up. He worked tirelessly to bring a doctor and a top-of-the-line medical facility to Drumright and helped spearhead the building of the Drumright Regional Hospital.

For many years, Rick and Myrna hosted the Drumright 4th of July Festival on their ranch north of town. It originally began as a small company party and over the course of the next 20 years it evolved into the go-to& July 4th event in the state of Oklahoma. It was a favorite summer tour stop for dozens of major and regional concert acts. Rick had more than a little bit in common with the great American showman, P.T. Barnum, and he wanted his festival to be unmatched in its grandiosity, flash, and razzle dazzle. And so, it was. The event

featured stilt walkers, flyovers, aerial parachute divers, helicopter landings, petting zoo, children's area, free parking, free food, and beer. The annual gathering also featured massive fireworks display that rivaled some major US cities. But the music was the icing on the cake for Rick, and each year the star power continued to grow, and included many well-known performers from country, Red Dirt, pop, and rock music, including B.J. Thomas, Roy Clark, Head East, Kix Brooks, Cody Canada and the Departed, and others. Rick Sellers was a larger-than-life figure. His zest for life was only matched by his kind heart and adventurous spirit. He loved his community, friends, and family, and in return, he was loved by many. Rick was preceded in death by his Father: Richard A.
