

The Frisco Caboose

You can't help but notice the big red caboose parked on the east side of the museum grounds. It was donated to the museum in 1989 by Judge Charles Woodson, a prominent Creek County judge for many years. He had the caboose remodeled into novelty guest quarters on his property. For train enthusiasts, this is a rare,

wood sided caboose, complete with a steel cupola. It dates to the mid-1930s. Traditionally, the caboose is attached at the end of the train, serving as an office, sleeping, and cooking quarters for crew and storage for tools, flags, and lanterns. The cupola on top was a lookout post that allowed the brakeman and flagman to see the train in motion. From that vantage point, they could spot shifting loads, dragging equipment or other problems. We would love to be able to refurbish this caboose in the future and allow visitors inside!



There are only two years that Drumright High School did not produce a yearbook, 1938 and 1940. The yearbook was named "The



Gusher" from the very beginning, and the museum has this collection of yearbooks beginning with the first edition in 1915. Times were hard in the late 1930s and there simply was no money to produce a yearbook. However, the students did produce a special edition of the local newspaper, "The Drumright Journal," dated May 12, 1938. This paper had a big class picture on the front page and feature stories about the seniors and their activities. The Class of 1938 had 123 class members, making it the biggest graduating class up to that date. Sadly, there was neither a yearbook nor special newspaper printed for the Class of 1940. By the way, the museum needs yearbooks from 2015-2023 to complete our collection.

Earl Eyman's Folk Figures

Drumright resident, Earl Eyman worked for the Sinclair Oil Company. He picked up the hobby of woodcarving while working as an oil pumper. The wood carvings of Earl Eyman in our museum's collection include figures of a Native American couple, a cowboy on his horse, The Last Supper with the disciples, plates, and goblets, and one of the early wing schools complete with pupils and a teacher. Also, you will find a complete forty-member marching unit of the Drumright High School Band. It is complete with a drum major, majorettes, and a flag team, plus flags, instruments, and batons. One of

his pieces, a DHS majorette, even turned up on the PBS classic, "Antiques Roadshow." Alberta Ferguson Bonebrake, DHS Class of 1948, presented it for an evaluation. Its value then was determined to be about \$800. He was prolific, producing hundreds of folk figures. The American Folk Art Museum in New York has many examples of his best works, including possum hunters, circus performers, butter churners, baseball teams, cowboys, and Indians.




