DOWN AT THE DEPOT

Dr. Durward Earl Newsom

Recently, the Drumright Historical Society Museum received two cases of books authored by D. Earl Newsom. You may recognize his name as the author of the "Drumright" books Volume I and II. The publisher, Evans Publications of Perkins, has closed its doors and sent the last remaining copies of these books to our museum. These volumes are packed with Drumright history beginning with Tom Slick and the Wheeler #1 in 1912 and ending with the growth and advancement of our community in the 1980s. We have an extremely limited number of these books available for purchase at \$28 per book. Please contact the museum to get your copies before they are gone.

As much as I have enjoyed reading his books and using them as references, I thought it would be a good thing to remember his life and retrace his connections to Drumright. He was an amazing journalist, mastering the printed media.

Durward Earl Newsom was born on January 9, 1919, in Drumright, Oklahoma to Jessie Earl and Ruth Louise Newsom. He grew up here, carried papers and at the age of sixteen, he began working as a reporter and sportswriter for the local paper, the Drumright Journal. After graduation from Drumright High School in 1936, he became the editor and then manager of the Drumright Journal. When the United States joined the Allied Forces

during World War II, Earl served in the U.S. Naval Reserves and attained the rank of Petty Officer First Class. After the war, he worked in Washington, D.C. as a Congressional aid for Lyle H. Boren.

The next phase of his life centered on education. Moving to Stillwater, he earned a bachelor's degree in journalism from Oklahoma A & M College (OSU). Continuing, he completed a Master of Science degree in Journalism from Northwestern University in 1949. These degrees allowed him to teach Journalism at Texas A & M from 1949 -1954. Then in 1954, he returned to Stillwater to pursue a doctorate in education. Upon completing his doctorate, he became a professor of journalism at the University of Maryland, where he was employed from 1957 - 1979.

Upon retirement, he returned to Oklahoma and pursued his love of history and journalism. He authored nearly a dozen books covering the history of Drumright, Stillwater, Payne County and Oklahoma, along with numerous articles and stories for the Stillwater News-Press and the Chronicles of Oklahoma. Collections of his papers, photos and writings have been donated to the Oklahoma State University Library Special Collections, the Sheerar Museum, and the **Drumright Historical Society**

Museum.

Dr. Durward Earl Newsom passed away on May 15, 2013. We want to honor the work and life of Dr. Newsom, while encouraging you to support your local museum and purchase this special set of books, "Drumright! The Glory Days of a Boomtown" (1985) and "Drumright II – A Thousand Memories" (1987). Down at the depot, you can find these books and a selection of several other books and items highlighting our community. Won't you come down and take a look!



Top 10 Biggest Drumright Wins in Baseball:

People might wonder what were some of the biggest Tornado baseball wins. Well, I have 10 wins that were the biggest, as far as I'm concerned.

- 10. The Tornadoes beat Olive 5-4 in 2004 and had already lost to them three times that year, facing them in two tournaments and losing to them 11-4 in one of those games, if I remember correctly. However, this one went to Drumright, although Olive was ahead most of the game. Travis Willing pitched and he or Lance Phillips hit a homer to put the Tornadoes ahead. Chris Cummins, Brian Fisher and Kyle Wright were some of the other players. Leading by five, the Tornadoes had to stop Olive in the top of the seventh inning.
- 9. The Tornadoes had a couple of huge wins during the district playoffs over Preston that wasn't expected. The Tornadoes had to beat Preston twice to get it done and they did, shocking the Preston nation. These wins were also in 2004.
- 8. In 1982, the Tornadoes beat Okemah 12-4 for the conference title. Okemah was 10-0 going into the first conference game. The Tornadoes were ahead 3-0 going into the third inning. Charles Carroll was striking Okemah batters out and picking them off, if they got on first. The Tornadoes hit four home-runs, two by Tony Lee, one by Gene Carroll and one by Charles Carroll with an almost homer for Larry Walsh. Back then, there weren't strict pitching rules, so Charles Carroll pitched almost every game. It started to sprinkle, not raining and Okemah left saying the game was a rain out. 30 minutes later, the sun was shining! Later, we beat Okemah at the Okmulgee tournament, where they didn't call the game off because of sprinkles.
- 7. The Tornadoes upset #9 Wellston, at Wellston. However, they lost the first game 12-5 but kept from getting run ruled, even with Wellston using their ace pitcher, who pitched the whole game and wasn't able to pitch the next day. The second game, Layne Foster pitched great and beat Wellston 3-0 with Paul Farless pitching the third game with a win of 14-7. The Tornadoes had great momentum and scored 11 runs in the first inning. Other players in this game were, CJ "Crazy Eyes" Blansett, Alex Russell, John Lechtenberg, Weston Morris, Zach Ruckman and Zach Duren.
- 6. Sometimes, things happen for a reason. Freshman, Doug Fulkerson was pitching against Cushing when the Tornadoes got beat 13-11. In the next game, Fulkerson got in trouble in the fifth inning but coach Bob Freeman left him in the game, which gave Fulkerson confidence. The Tornadoes ended up beating Cushing 3-2 in nine innings, leading the Tornadoes to their first state tournament after previously winning the Perkins Regional, where they played Tonkawa in the first game. The score was tied at 10-10, when Tonkawa had a base hit, which made it look like it would seal the winning run. However, in centerfield was Blake Gibson who threw the ball to cut the runner off. Richard Duren threw it in to brother, Russell Duren, at catcher, getting the runner out. This was the most electric play, ever! Seconds later, clouds rolled in, the tornado whistle blew and we had to take shelter. Someone forgot to get John Ledgerwood and had to go back and pick him up. I'm not sure it even rained. The tornadoes ended up winning in extra innings 19-10. The day the Tornadoes played #4 Perkins, they beat us twice, 16-9 and 9-8 but the tornadoes won the

third game 16-4. Mike Ledgerwood hit a homer to help us get the win. Meeker would end up needing to beat us twice but didn't even beat us once, with the Tornadoes winning 12-6. The Tornadoes beat Silo 10-2 in the first round of state but lost to Latta 17-7. Blake Gibson hit a homer against Latta's stud pitcher.

- 5. In 2007, the Tornadoes welcomed coach Blake Flewellen. They played Chouteau in the first round of regionals at Lincoln Christian and then went on to play the #5 Lincoln Christian Bulldogs, who looked like adults. Thankfully, they couldn't hit Jacob Vogts curveball and the Tornadoes won 3-1. Lincoln Christian beat us in the second game 12-4 but in the third we pitched Vogt again and won 4-2 where Corbin Vaughn showed the most emotion I have ever seen from him, he was a pretty quiet guy. Levi Fulkerson, one of our best players, got hurt in the first inning. As he was sliding into home, the bulldogs catchers shin guard messed up Fulkersons leg and he didn't get to play the rest of the game but the Tornadoes ended up winning. Fulkerson and Josh Gutierrez were both great pitchers and could hit the ball a mile. Other players were, Layne Foster, Nick Dorsey, Boone Boyer, Brad Wright, Ryan Haskins, Tyler Nicholson and Adam Marshall.
- 4. In 1977, coach Jerry Geyer and the Tornadoes upset #1 Meeker. Meeker had a great pitcher, I believe his name was Virgil Fowler. It was said that there was a professional scout who came to watch him play at Drumright, where Mike Boyer had a two run homer against him. Wayne "Bones" Wright pitched for Drumright and had the game of his life, striking out multiple Meeker players to win the game 2-1.
- 3. The first round of the 1986 state tournament, the year we won it all. Drumright played Minco, who had won state in basketball, making them 0-5 in baseball. Once Minco started to roll, they became dominant and made it a tough first round. Minco hit the ball very hard most of the game, making the Tornadoes down 9-8. In the bottom of the seventh, Doug Fulkerson hit a two run single helping the torndoes score two runs to win 10-9. The game was at Konowa due to being rained out in Seminole. The next day, we had two games at Chandler baseball camp. The semifinals was against Latta at Latta, who had thumped us two years before. It was strange back then that the team got to host semifinal games. It was said that Latta pitching staff was unreal. We started ahead 5-0 and right off the bat, Barry Wells, who was used at times as a pitcher, shut down Latta with help from shortstop, Brian Burden. Burden fielded the ball at short, stepped on second and threw it to first for a double play. It did not last, as Latta lead 8-6 going into the bottom of the sixth, when the Tornadoes erupted for 14 runs. The great Latta pitching staff was decimated 20-8. Carl Sherwood led off with a double and the doubles kept coming from just about everyone. We bunted them to death, including a great squeeze bunt from Barry Gibson to score Pat Garst as the tornado fans went crazy! Pat Burden hit a three run homer and the Tornadoes who were down 8-6 going into the inning, run ruled Latta in the same inning. That was game two of the tournament and we had to wait five hours to play again. During this time, Class B Asher was playing Leedey, I believe. Plus, the other game was the other semifinal game between Dale and Hennessey. Hennessey was favored to win the whole tournament, but Billy Sims, who was a small guy with a great arm struck out 20 batters in a 4-3 10 inning game. Probably as exciting a game ever seen.
- 2. The Tornadoes, coached by Tom Schooley, were at the Depew tournament against Liberty

Mounds and their stud pitcher, Rudy Garcia, who later pitched at the University of Arkansas. The first two innings, no one could see the ball, Garcia was throwing so fast. The Tornadoes trailed 3-0 going into the top of the third with the bottom of the lineup to bat. Jay Ernst and Jimmy Anderson hit back to back doubles on Garcia. It was just like the movies! The whole team was hitting the ball and Tornado pitcher, Greg Fulkerson threw a ton of his patented curve balls, we won 5-4 as second baseman, Jeff Hall fielded a grounder and threw to David Rickner at first to win the game. Rudy Garcia is now the boys basketball coach at Tulsa Union.

1. The Tornadoes played Dale in the 1986 state finals. Dale only had a 40 minute rest from the Hennessey game and looked tired. Randy Plunkett, 6'6 and left handed was the pitcher for Dale, who over the years was the most effective pitcher for the Stroud American Legion team and also had Billy Sims and great hitter, Travis Reese, a lefty. Even though Dale had only 40 minutes to rest, Drumright had waited over five hours to play after the Latta game. Pat Burden was doing a great job pitching, the game was tied 2-2 going into the top of the sixth. The Tornadoes went ahead 8-4, as the tired Dale team had multiple errors and gave up many walks. The last inning, Doug Fulkerson came in to pitch for the Tornadoes, getting Dale out in three batters. The last was Bret Flewellen, fielding a grounder at second and throwing to Barry Well's at first. Tony Moyer's Tornadoes finished 25-6 (others had started with Wayne Williams). Ronald Fowler, a sophomore was appointed as first base coach by coach Moyer. Others on the team were, Chris Sherwood, Vernon Moore, Bennie Wilkerson, Mark Stevens, and eigth grader, Blake Flewellen, who went to every game and sat in the dugout. You couldn't see the players because of the huge crowd who came out to see the Tornadoes play in the state finals, I had never seen that at any other game.


