

DOWN AT THE DEPOT

Fjords, Ferries, Villages and Trails

There are days when you just happen to be at the right place at the right time. I have recently started attending the Cimarron Valley Historical Society meetings. I'm interested in Drumright history, as well as the history of our surrounding areas, too. I was offered a copy of a map that was recently done by Mr. Calvin Wright. This map is an absolute treasure, as it shows the locations of the **Cimarron River crossings** and other points of interest within a 200 square mile area of western Creek and eastern Payne counties.

Now you might think, "Why is this map of river crossings so interesting?" This map pinpoints the 19th and early 20th century fjords, ferries, pedestrian bridges and small communities that existed before, during and after the discovery of oil in this area. Towards the north, the map extends to old Hwy 51 and McElroy Road. Towards the south, Ninth Street is the boundary. To the west, Hwy 108 is the boundary and to the east, the map extends to Hwy 99/16.

Down at the depot, there are several old photographs of some of these locations, such as the Schaffer Ferry, that was north of Drumright. There is also an exceptional drawing of horses pulling the McMann Ferry across the Cimarron River, just south of Oilton. This drawing was done by Fred Coley and presented to Dowell Incorporated in 1953 and was later gifted to this museum. If you have wanted to explore the Cimarron Valley and find some of these old locations, you might want to check out this map. The map shows the locations of these small communities of yesteryear... Pemeta, Vida Way, Markham, Villa, Shafter, Schlegel, Ghost Hollow and Ingalls.

The West Shawnee Cattle Trail that existed just west of Cushing, is shown in detail as it crosses each mile section on this map. This trail was a major route for driving longhorn cattle from Texas to the Kansas railheads. The western trail existed because the longhorns were banned from passing through more settled regions east of here. The longhorns could carry diseases that might infect the herds of farmers and ranchers. So, the West Shawnee Trail left the Texas Road at the Boggy Depot, and came north through this area.

ndered just where and how did the folks of yesteryear cross the Cimarron River. Back then, you had to look for fjords, which are safe, low water crossings to drive your horses or cattle across or possibly, you would pay to have your team and wagon ferried across the river. These ferries were basically built as a flat barge to carry horses, teams and wagons across the river for a fee. Storms and floods destroyed most ferries over time, so it's amazing that some photographs even exist.

Come on down to the depot and check out this phenomenal map of the Cimarron River. I'm sure that you will find something interesting you will want to explore further.

DISASTER RELIEF MINISTRY

Cimarron Baptist Association (CBA) celebrated 15 years of Disaster Relief Ministry on March 15 at Camp Lela near Glencoe. In 2008, the Lord illuminated the need for a chainsaw ministry by the large ice storm that hit Drumright and Cushing areas. Seven members of the Southern Baptist Disaster Relief went to work the very next day and worked for six weeks, cutting damaged trees and limbs for citizens of those communities. Dr. Tom Owens, the late Director of Missions for CBA, approached the Executive Board of the Association to establish chainsaw as an official ministry to the 52 church association. Over the years, the ministry has increased to include a laundry and recovery ministry.

The celebration was well attended with 80 volunteers, enjoying food and fellowship. The event was also attended by two special guests; Sam Porter, Director Emeritus and Jason Yarbrough, current Disaster Relief Director. They presented the Oklahoma 2022 Trail Blazer Award to Ted Wilson, from Drumright. He has served in chainsaw ministry since 2002 and helped initiate the CBA Disaster Relief Ministry.

Rodney Blaine Carroll

Rodney Blaine Carroll passed away due to heart complications on March 7, 2023 in Tulsa, Oklahoma at age 60 years, 8 months, & 12 days,. His daughter Katie was at his side, holding his hand as Jesus reached for his. "Rod" was born on June 23, 1962, to R.D. "Bucky" and Loy Ann Carroll and was the oldest of four children. He graduated from Olive High School and began working in the oil industry as a pumper, as his grandpa R.F. "Bob" Carroll had done. Rod always said being a pumper was his favorite job, followed by his food truck business with Green Country Catering.

At a very young age, Rod was enraptured with horses. His first horse was 'ol Jockey Boy, a Shelton pony Rod would ride every day until sunset. He began his Rodeo Career at age five when he rode a racehorse named "Tag." If Rod could get Tag turned around the first barrel, they'd win; if not, they'd take a lap around the arena and wave to the crowd. Throughout Rod's youth, his talent for horsemanship and rodeo grew. He was an Oklahoma Junior Rodeo Association member, where he roped on a horse named Okie Bob. He was among the youngest invited to the annual Ben Johnson Steer Roping. Later in his rodeo career, he became a member of the Professional Rodeo Cowboy Association and performed on the most prestigious rodeo stage, Cheyenne Frontier Days, otherwise known as The Daddy of 'em all. Rod traveled all over the country with a close-knit group of friends, and many admired "The Carroll Boys" for their ability to make a great calf horse.

As much as Rod loved to "hit the dusty," his love for his wife and children never wavered. He called Kathy Crow for the first time on November 11, 1981, and proposed just three weeks later. Kathy and Rod were married for thirty-nine years, and "Katherine," as only Rod called her, was his best friend. They had two children, Katie and Blaine. Rodeoing across the country eventually turned into taking Katie to play softball and helping Blaine become a top-notch calf-roper and horseman.

Besides being a dad, Rod's biggest thrill was becoming a PawPaw. His grandsons, Wyatt Blaine, and Waylon James, were his best buddies, always on Rod's heels.

Rod was preceded in death by his father: R.D. "Bucky " Carroll; & paternal grandparents: R.F. & Edith Carroll. He is survived by his wife: Katherine Carroll; his mother: Loy Ann Carroll; daughter: Katie Carroll-Wilson and husband Josh; son: Blaine Carroll and wife Taylor; grandchildren: Wyatt Blaine McLintock Applegate, Waylon James Wilson, & Adelyn Chenoa Wilson; sister: Leigh Ann Miracle; brothers: Jay Carroll and Paul Carroll; and several nieces, nephews, cousins, other relatives, and friends.

Andrea Michelle Parkell


