DOWN AT THE DEPOT

Honoring a Purple Heart, Again!

If you have followed my stories, you may remember one from 2020 regarding a heroic young soldier from Drumright named Lester Jordan Nunley. Born in Davenport on September 13, 1934, he was raised by his mother, Mrs. Nettie Radford, who lived at 335 East Hickory, here in Drumright. Lester was barely 18 years old when he enlisted in the United States Army.

His basic training was completed at an Army base in San Francisco, California; then his unit was shipped off to Korea. Private Nunley was a member of the 15th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Infantry Division, Company C. Fighting in the battle zone of Chorwon, North Korea, he was hit by a mortar shell and killed in action on June 11, 1953.

Plans were specified for Private Nunley's military funeral. His body was flown from Korea, back to the United States. Then arrangements were made to ship Private Nunley's body from Oakland, California to his hometown of Drumright, Oklahoma. The body was escorted by SFC Howard M. Shehan. Mr. E. C. Smith of Smith Funeral Home, met the MK&T train in Cushing to receive the body.

The Drumright American
Legion and VFW post
facilitated the military
service, which was held on
Sunday, August 30, 1953 at
the Methodist Church. The
Legion and VFW members
comprised the pall bearers,
color guard and rifle party.
Private Nunley was buried
with full military honors in

the Drumright North Cemetery.

Now, we fast forward to the spring of 2020 when Mr. Greg Dyer, Stroud Postmaster, found a box at the American Legion building in Bristow. This box contained the original 1953 newspaper clipping of Private Nunley's obituary, a Purple Heart medal, a triangular, folded funeral

American flag, a condolence letter from President Dwight D. Eisenhower, two small pictures of a young woman and some miscellaneous military items and medals. This find was so compelling, Mr. Dyer had to take action. He built a wooden framed shadow box, (four feet long and two feet high) in the image of an American flag. These priceless items are beautifully displayed within this handcrafted shadow box.

Back in 2020, Mr. Dyer contacted Barbara Vice, then editor of the Drumright Gusher. She contacted me and we ran the first story detailing the discovery of these important items that highlighted the service of this Drumright hero, Private Lester Jordan Nunley. We were hoping that someone would see the article, come forward and tell us how the box came to be deposited at the American Legion building in Bristow. We also hoped that family members might see the story and come forward to

recognize this young man. No such luck!

Now skipping to May, 2023, I was on the agenda of the Cimarron Valley Historical Society to speak about a "mystery topic". Since it was close to Memorial Day, I remembered this particular story and how we never located any next of kin with whom we could share the story of our Drumright hero. So, I shared this story with the CVHS members in attendance at this meeting and within two days, a family member was identified and contacted.

Angela Titus, the current Drumright Chamber of Commerce President, happens to be a second cousin to Private Nunley. She was in amazement to discover this shadow box on display at our local museum. Actually, she has been inside the museum many times, but never knew her cousin's life was on display here. She believes that the pictures of a young woman are actually of Private Nunley's mother. No one in her family knows how the box of military memorabilia arrived at the American Legion in Bristow.

It has taken seventy years for this story to come full circle. The family of Private Lester Jordan Nunley is very grateful that the story of this hometown hero has been remembered and that the Purple Heart honoring his sacrifice will be permanently on display right where it belongs, down at the depot, in the Drumright Historical Society Museum.
