Way back in 1965, Mrs. Emma E. Akin and Mrs. H.F. Facker presented the idea of establishing a permanent organization to preserve and present the unique history of Drumright. That was the birth of the Drumright Historical Society. Over the next two years, they obtained the vacant old Santa Fe Depot to be used aThe last week of August 1939, "The Wizard of Oz" premiered. This eternally popular American movie starred Judy Garland as Dorothy, a Kansas farm girl, whose home was taken to the sky by a tornado, only to come down and land on top of a Wicked Witch. Dorothy emerges into a marvelous land ruled by a benevolent wizard and populated by Munchkins and menacing flying monkeys. This is where the story of Fern

Formica, the actress, begins. Fern was actually Jeannette Fern McDill, from Drumright, Oklahoma. Fern was a Munchkin, and down at the depot, we have the photos to prove it!

Fern was born January 17, 1925, in Drumright, to Harry and Flora Belle McDill. Times were hard and the family left Oklahoma during the 1930s, moving to California. She entered the movie industry as a child actress. Fern was a little person, and with her curly blonde hair, she doubled for Shirley Temple in the movie, "Bright Eyes." In 1938, Fern appeared in "The Terror of Tiny Town" as Diamond Dolly, a saloon girl.

Then in 1939, a casting call went out from MGM to find 124 little people to take the roles of Munchkins in a

new movie, "The Wizard of Oz."
Fern was barely a teenager, but
she was cast in two roles, a
villager, and a sleepyhead. The
villager role is noteworthy
because Fern is one of the very
first Munchkins to appear from
the bushes to greet Dorothy. As a
villager, she is dressed in a
"Mother Hubbard" looking outfit,
with a single flower affixed to
the top of her bonnet.

In later years, the little people in this movie were known to comment about the pay they received during the three months of filming. Each little person received \$50 per day, while the dog cast as Toto, received \$100 per day.

Fern went on to appear in Las Vegas as a singer and dancer. She also appeared in other movies and shows. Later in life, she married a Sicilian man named Mike Formica, and they adopted a son. By the age of 50, Fern had grown to 4 feet 6 inches. After retiring from show business, Fern attended an art college in England, learning how to do ceramics. She returned home to California and in 1977, opened a ceramics studio. Her unique ceramic items were Munchkins, painted to look like those characters from the movie. Fern passed away just one week after her 70th birthday. She died of heart and lung failure on January 23, 1995.

At the Drumright Historical

Museum, we have a fantastic display of photos as a tribute to our hometown star, Fern Formica. And how much more fitting is it that we honor Fern Formica exactly 85 years after the premier of her most memorable movie role as a Munchkin in "The Wizard of Oz. Wouldn't it be fun to have a Fern Formica Film Festival this fall? Let's talk about it!





Brenda Sue Butler

Funeral services for Olive resident, Brenda Butler, were held 2:00 p.m. Saturday, August 3rd at the Olive First Baptist Church. Bro. Joey Johnson & Rev. George "Marty" Brock, III officiated. Interment followed in the Butler Family Cemetery on the farm. Funeral arrangements were entrusted to the care of Michael's Funeral Home of Drumright, Oklahoma.

Brenda was born in Pryor, Oklahoma on June 15, 1947 to the late Leroy Cobb & Almeta Lilliane (Willis) Cobb. She passed from this life at her home in Olive on July 30, 2024 at the age of 77 years, 1 month, & 15 days. Brenda was raised and educated in Sand Springs. On New Years Eve in 1962, she met her soon to be husband on a blind date; Johnny Butler. They knew they were meant to be together and decided to get married. She was 15 & he was 17. Since she was not old enough to sign the marriage license for herself Brenda tracked down her biological father (whom she had not seen since she was 3 years old) in Broken Arrow. Although her mother had remarried, Leroy Cobb was still listed as one of her legal guardians. He accompanied them to the courthouse to sign the marriage license. They were married by the Bro. Reed, the preacher of Skyview Assembly of God Church in his home. Brenda's mother, Almeta, went to the police and tried to have Johnny arrested for kidnapping. Johnny and Brenda went to Sapulpa to the local amusement park and then they hid with friends for several days to let Brenda's mom and stepdad calm down. It took a year and the addition of a baby girl born days before their first wedding anniversary for Brenda's mom to calm down. On their 25th wedding anniversary, Brenda's mom finally admitted that "you kids just might make it."

In 1974, Johnny and Brenda bought their current home, known as "The Forty," and renovated the old farmhouse on the land. They moved their family from Keystone on January 1, 1975, into the house that became the family home. Brenda earned her cosmetology license in the late 1960s and spent the next 25 years working as a hairdresser. She had a home beauty shop for many years before becoming a certified Cosmetology Instructor and teaching cosmetology for several years. In the mid-1980s she opened her own shop, The Hair Mechanics, in Cushing. She spent many years supporting her children in their activities. She was a Girl Scout Leader, a 4-H Leader, and an FFA Supporter. During Johnny's senior year of high school, she attended all but two of his baseball and basketball games, matching the attendance record of his coaches. She loved all of her kids and grandkids. She liked to spoil the kids but was often heard saying, "Nana didn't spoil the babies; Papa spoiled them!" She was able to watch three generations of her kids' activities and was proud of each. In addition to her mother & father, she was preceded in death by a son: James Wesley Butler; her Husband: Johnny Butler; & a Sister: Sandra Butler.
